This is the day we all come together in the shops to make pink and white quilt blocks and sew them together into quilts. The guilts will then be sent to Better Homes & Gardens American Patchwork and Quilting magazine to be photographed and put on e-Bay to be auctioned. The proceeds from the sale of these quilts will be given to the Susan G. Komen Foundation Breast Cancer Research fund.

Now here is what we can all do to help. Save your pink and your white scraps. You know they don't all have to be the same shades of pink or white. Think of block patterns you would like to

make and of simply sewn quilts you would like to make. When we are together and we add whatever pink and white fabrics we can from H&C and VSQ we will team up and sew all day to make as many quilts as we can as a group to send away.

Last year when the program was announced, they thought that they might have about 5,000 blocks sent in. However, there were 25,000 blocks. Hopefully, we can help to contribute to the finished quilts in 2006. We feel that this is a worthy effort and that it may contribute to the relief of women everywhere, especially some who could be among us. The statistics show that likely there are more near us who will be affected by this horrible disease. Let's join together to help in the fight for the cure!!!

Make It You

Five national companies have joined together their research and development teams along with their marketing groups to create a program for young persons who wish to become sewers. Husqvarna Viking, Pffaf, RJR Fabrics, Primedia, and C & T Publishing have very young, smart youngster who are collaborating with each other to create this program referred to as miy Studio.

The persons who choose to be a part of the Studio are now referred to as Artists and will range in age from 13 to 30. The Artists will choose fabrics

from the RIR line of miv prints or otherwise to make the items found in Sew Hip, a book of sewing projects written by Husqvarna Viking Educator Shannon Mullen. There will be an introductory session for participants that directs them to "re-style" a pair of jeans to become one-of-a-kind. Then there will be a number of sessions scheduled when the artists will style their owns belts, bags, pillows, and quilts. These sessions are planned over the next year and after they are completed, there is a second phase that we have not yet learned about.



Notice in the class schedule part of this newsletter when the sessions will be held at each shop. We wish to make this program accessible to those who are interested in learning to sew. The projects are kicky and the fabrics are bright! We have a winner here for persons who like to make their things unique.

share many ideas, hints, and tips you can use to expand your design collection and get you moti-





In Memoriam Sara N. Newton 1917 - 2006

"Mema" as she was affectionately known by her family and to anyone who became associated with her, inspired us all with her love of life, passion for quilting, her homespun philosophy, and last but not least, her very frank tell it like it is approach to life. Her passion for quilting resulted in her giving away quilts at Christmas, weddings, births, graduations plus any special occasion to her children, 10 grand children, and 10 great grand children. She was already planning quilts for the next two great grands due in December. Her real love and motivation was seeing the faces and the tears when the recipients opened up their heirloom treasures.

She was the inspiration and part of the "perspiration" of Heirlooms and Comforts. Mema taught in the first location of H & C and continued for years until her health limited her activity. Her first class we called "Quilting, Philosophy, and Southern Colloquialisms" and all who attended will never forget her wisdom and the inspiration she provided. Class members were not the only ones who benefited because anyone who paused to talk would be the recipient of the down home manner in which she approached life and might get some advice even without asking.

In her later years she could often be found in one of the rocking chairs at H & C moving it in a circle to be able to participate in someone's selection of fabrics.

We all will greatly miss you and your influence, Mema.
